PERMITTING SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF CHILD SUPPORT SERVICES TO FILE DOCUMENTS WITH ELECTRONIC SIGNATURE GENERAL ORDER OF THE PRESIDING JUDGE

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Superior Court of California, County of San Bernardino, was closed from March 17, 2020 through May 28, 2020, and only hearing essential, time-sensitive matters in accordance with emergency orders and statewide orders issued by Chief Justice Tani Cantil-Sakauye, countywide and statewide orders issued by the San Bernardino County Public Health Officer and the State Public Health Officer, executive orders issued by Governor Gavin Newsom, and general implementation orders issued by the court.

Public health agencies, including the CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and local county health departments have recommended increasingly stringent social distancing measures of at least six feet between people, and they encourage vulnerable individuals to avoid public gatherings and spaces. They have also required

essential businesses to proactively manage social distancing and other safety and health measures. (The State of California has deemed courts essential businesses).

These mandates impact the court's ability to provide services, process new and existing case filings, and perform other court work.

In her March 30, 2020 statewide orders, the Chief Justice encouraged courts to use technology to conduct judicial proceedings and court operations remotely to protect the health and safety of the public, court personnel, judicial officers, litigants, and witnesses. The San Bernardino County Department of Child Support Services (SBC DCSS) has represented to the court that it has developed a procedure to allow parties to use an electronic signature process that will 1) ensure the voluntary nature of execution of stipulations signed by all necessary parties, 2) ensure the validity of the signature and 3) memorialize the circumstances surrounding the execution of stipulations signed electronically.

Consequently, pursuant to California Rule of Court 10.603 and the Chief Justice's March 30, 2020 statewide order, the court HEREBY ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:

With the exception of documents which impose a penalty of perjury on the signatory, SBC DCSS may file, and the court shall accept for filing, paper filed documents requiring signatures, including stipulations between SBC DCSS and the parties they serve, that have been executed using electronic signature technology as if bearing original signatures.

THIS ORDER IS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY.
